Toronto Home Retrofits: Spreading the Pocket Change Eve Wyatt and Paul Dowsett

Our homes and buildings are vital to our wellbeing, social connectivity and economy — but they are also Canada's third-largest source of emissions.



Pocket Change Project:

- Volunteer-run committee founded in 2017 in "The Pocket" (neighbourhood in the east Danforth area of Toronto)
- A community group of neighbours helping neighbours to reduce individual and collective carbon footprints.
- Offers a retrofit coordination service in Toronto's east end which demonstrates a demand for retrofits, advice, and GHG reductions

Why Encourage Home Retrofits?





What is a retrofit?

A retrofit is an improvement that reduces your home's carbon emissions and energy use. These retrofits often make your home:

- More comfortable
- Less expensive to heat
- Healthier
- Kinder to the environment

What do our homes have to do with the climate crisis?



- •Climate change is largely caused by burning fossil fuels, which emits greenhouse gases.
- •Most of Ontario's houses are heated with gas ... a fossil fuel.
- Emissions from burning gas in homes are a significant part of communities' greenhouse gas emissions.*
- •Electrifying space and water heating and appliances can reduce your home's greenhouse gas emissions by +90%.
- •We must reduce emissions from each of our single-family homes to meet our communities' and Canada's climate goals.

*Single family homes contribute 17% of Toronto's GHG emissions

The goal: Replace gas with electricity

Space heating: Heat pump



Water heating: Electric/Heat pump water heater



Cooking: Induction range/ cooktop



Dryer, fireplace, barbecue:
Electric appliances



And air seal/insulate for **energy efficiency** where it is effective and feasible.



Taking personal action helps people cope with climate anxiety



Reducing emissions from home space and water heating, cooking, and appliances



Reducing emissions from transportation and travel




Consuming less meat and dairy products



Why do people begin this journey?

- A home renovation or upgrade
- A failing heating or AC system
- An uncomfortable house- hot, cold, or drafty
- Concern about health effects of gas
- High utility bills
- Concern about climate change and future generations
- A combination of the above

Every house is different ... all the questions can feel like an obstacle course!



How does the Pocket Change Project help?









The Pocket

- 1100 homes, 3500 people
- No through streets
 - Kids can play in the streets
 - Great for street parties
- A cohesive community with an active Pocket Community
 Association
- The Pocket Change Project, a committee of the PCA, addressing climate change through home retrofits, EVs, etc.



Pocket Change: Neighbours helping Neighbours


- Provides a supportive community of peers.
- Shares useful information website, webinars
- Links homeowners with personal objective advice and coaching
- Celebrates successful projects





Who are the Pocket Changemakers?

- 1- Early Adopters (first year, 10 homes)
- 12 climate-motivated homeowners
- 2- Inspired by neighbours (second year, 30 homes)
- Motivated by yard signs, word-of-mouth
- 3- Ready Recruits (underway, 100+ homes)
- Identified by survey
 - Aging furnace or A/C
 - Planning a renovation
 - Climate-concerned



Results?

Among 30 Changemakers:

- 15 homes with air source heat pumps
- 8 gas water heaters replaced with electric
- 13 homes air sealed and/or insulation improved
- 3 homes off gas entirely
- Projects continue...



Toronto Home Retrofits (THR) is...

... a not-for-profit that is scaling up the Pocket Change model. THR will:

- **support Toronto community groups** helping their members to "green" their homes.
- offer informative materials and a roster of advisors to assist homeowners through the home retrofit.
- accelerate home retrofits in communities across Toronto to help meet TransformTO emissions reduction goals.



How can my community help?





Communities can

- Show that retrofits are practical and benefit homeowners
- Encourage homeowners who are interested in learning more and motivate them to retrofit their homes
- Support homeowners during the retrofit with neighbour-to-neighbour support and shared experience
- Celebrate homeowner successes and community results

The Retrofit Leadership Team

- •Introduces and promotes the home retrofit project
- Engages interested homeowners
- •Guides homeowners to general information and personalized audit and advice
- •Stays in touch with homeowners; helps solve problems
- •Cultivates a peer community of interested homeowners
- Celebrates and documents completed projects
- Liaises with THR to get resources and tech support

The key: Technical Advice

- Homeowners want advice from a knowledgeable, trustworthy advisor
- The advisor can be
 - ☐ A committed energy advisor this is beyond the energy audit
 - ☐ A specialist architect or engineer
 - ☐ A committed and technically-inclined homeowner
- •The cost of advice (\$500-\$1000) is a sound investment:
 - Saves time
 - ☐ Helps select cost-effective actions
 - ☐ Helps ensure contract is good value



The Advisory Service

Creates a personal roadmap for the homeowner and home (considering the energy audit, technical advice, cost)

Helps homeowners find qualified contractors and arrange contracts

Helps access financing and incentives

Answers questions and resolves issues

What we have learned

- Keep the focus on reducing GHG emissions electrifying space and water heating
- Tailor energy efficiency to the home's condition:
- o Air sealing (including duct sealing) is affordable and effective in older homes
- Insulate where there are cost-effective opportunities or comfort issues
- Affordability is usually top of mind, and differs between homeowners
- Consider embodied carbon when choosing materials (e.g. avoid foam insulation)
- Each homeowner is on a journey, taking one step at a time
- Be patient Leadership Team commitment is key

Seniors for Climate Action Now! (SCAN!) Gale Greer

SCAN!

- A social movement that informs and mobilizes seniors in an effort to prevent further climate catastrophes.
- Supports the lead of young people, and recognizes Indigenous Peoples' central role in addressing the climate emergency
- Started in Toronto just three years ago with 20 people, now with over 500!

Gail Greer, Ph.D. - joyful environmental activist

- Taught sociology at Queen's in the 1980's and ran a business until retiring in 2009
- Recognized a mass social movement is needed to create a sustainable and just society
- Contributing analytical, research, and writing skills to Seniors for Climate Action Now!

A: Paralyzed by Guilt and Shame –

We have been sold the message by major polluters – We Are Guilty; all this happened on our watch; Even Greta Thunberg says it's our fault!

B: War waged on us by Big Oil


 To keep us from taking collective action – a \$3.6 BILLION war has been waged against us over the last 50 years, by Big Oil, "to mislead the public and prevent crucial action to address climate change."



C: Women's leadership has been STIFLED

Mary Robinson

- First Woman President of Ireland
- The Mary Robinson Foundation for Climate Justice.



D: Diminished Collective Power

We don't have the strength for GROUP collective action... of the tribe...except for church and social justice groups, and some unions.





- Work with intact groups people already in a group.
- Ask questions about their reality, interests and concerns, Listen and Empathize, Inform, and Drive toward Action Planning
- Don't fret family and friends by trying to convert them.







 We ask questions of GROUPS, so they are co-creating a strategy, as they discuss with each other, for Action.

 Speak confidingly. Think of everyone as your collaborators, co-conspirators, in the fight to save life on earth.





- The people who willingly come to our Climate Conversations
 - are not looking for a lot more information:
 - They want to know what can we DO, if it's not too late.

 Ask BETTER Questions. Prepare, before any encounter, your QUESTIONS.





- OUR asking THEM questions communicates your confidence in them to do the right thing. Telling them suggests they won't be able to act until they know as much as you do.
- Affirm everything they do and say sincerely, imaginatively. No arguments. No rebuttals.
- Lend them your positive energy and affection





 Love. Empathize. Like them. Be likeable.


 Storytelling. The shortest route from one heart to another is telling our stories to each other.

Transform TO 2030 Goals by Sector

Homes & Buildings

- All new homes and buildings will be designed and built to be near zero greenhouse gas emissions
- Greenhouse gas emissions from existing buildings will be cut in half, from 2008 levels

Energy

- 50 percent of community-wide energy comes from renewable or low-carbon sources
- 25 percent of commercial and industrial floor area is connected to low carbon thermal energy sources

Transportation

- 30 percent of registered vehicles in Toronto are electric
- 75 percent of school/work trips under 5 km are walked, biked or by transit

Waste

- 70 percent residential waste diversion from the City of Toronto's waste management system
- Identify pathways to more sustainable consumption in City of Toronto operations and in Toronto's economy



Serendipitous Story

About 4 years ago, before the pandemic, I and a few others formed a small group, in concert with our local TransformTO climate champion, to work on climate issues.

We:

- held one public forum online
- then discovered that there were others in south Etobicoke who had also just formed
- so we combined our groups and founded the Etobicoke Climate Action group
- then sponsored some online events during the pandemic

These Town Halls enabled partnerships to be formed with local groups, including church groups, which helped when advertising other online workshops we've held.
